Institutional-cum-Faculty Development Programme (ICFDP) at XIMU, Bhubaneshwar

All Faculty of Xavier Institute of Social Service (XISS) attended an Institutional-cum-Faculty Development Programme (ICFDP) at Xavier Institute of Management (XIMU), Bhubaneswar from 16-20 June 2023.

During the inaugural session, Dr Joseph Marianus Kujur SJ, Director laid out the objectives and expected benefits of the program, which emphasized developing a blueprint for implementation of National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 in XISS. He further discussed the institutional and personal growth toward the consolidation and expansion of the Institution. His focus areas during the address were the enhancement of knowledge and skills, motivation, analyzing the needs of the Institute at present and in the future, and clarity about concise learning objectives and outcomes.

Further, Dr Amar E. Tigga, Dean Academics urged everyone to be competent enough to bring change in the nation in which 'transforming human beings' is important. He also emphasized learning by doing.

Session 1 of the day focused on the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) Accreditation Process where Dr Andrew Dutta, Dean, XIMU shared about System-Process-Procedure, Multiple Schools of Academics, and Review of Self-Study-Report (SSR) of many institutions. Session 2 focused on admission where Fr Antony Uvery, Vice Chancellor, XIMU, and Dr Bikram Kumar Bahinipati, Incharge, Admissions, XIMU discussed the insights. It included entrance examinations, the importance of past academic records, relevant work experience, reservation systems, transparent, eligibility and selection process for admission, and scholarship for meritorious students.

Session 3 began with a Programme-wise Review of the Proposed Schools of the new XISS University. On Day 2, during Session 4 & 5, Prof S. P. Pani discussed in detail the New Education Policy 2020. Dr Pani highlighted the aim of NEP, which is to not change the basic personality of a student. He emphasized on the relevance of Artificial Intelligence, Data Science, Life Style, International Exposure, Fast changing Skill etc. He stated that Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) is the guiding factor and Higher Education Information System (HEIs) must develop into Multidisciplinary Education and Research University (MERU). Session 6 primarily focused on programme-wise presentation by Faculty on NEP where each program's key highlights and implementation strategies were discussed.

XISS Director attends National Conference on Local Democratic Governance in India organised by Azim Premji University

India's journey toward local democratic administration began in 1993 with the introduction of the 73rd and 74th Constitutional Amendments, and 2023 marks 30 years of this journey.

Together with the Forest Rights Act and the Panchayats Extension to Scheduled Areas (PESA) Act (among other provisions), a strong institutional framework for local autonomy, local democratic decision-making, and assertion of marginalised groups has now been established. It also includes deliberative spaces for public discourse.

After many years, it is now time to reflect on the experiences on the ground, understand the public narrative, and choose the best course of action. The path of local democratic governance in India was the topic of a three-day national conference from 21-23 June 2023 being held by Azim Premji University in Ranchi.

The conference focused to reflect on the 30-year journey of local democracy in India in the forms of Panchayati Raj, also PESA, FRA, and other enabling provisions. It generated dialogue between practitioners, academics, policy thinkers, public representatives, and the media and how they contributed to the journey of local democracy in Jharkhand.

Several sessions were planned during the conference where Director, XISS moderated a session on Implementation of the PESA and FRA: Taking stock and going forward. It was a Jharkhand-focused session which showed an overview of the functioning of local democratic institutions in Jharkhand, under 73rd Amendment, PESA and FRA, and emerging efforts in strengthening local democracy in the state.

Other sessions included deep-dive thinking into academic exchange, policy exchange, good practices exchange, elected representatives exchange, and media and communications.

Jharkhand has recorded the highest percentage of underage girls getting married, according to the latest demographic sample survey by the Union Home Ministry. The percentage of girls getting married before attaining majority is as high as 5.8 in Jharkhand, according to the survey by the Registrar General and Census Commissioner, Ministry of Home Affairs (2022). The Sampark program, a collaboration between XISS and UNICEF Jharkhand, is progressing with the set objectives and goals. In the month of June, the SBCC DPCs deputed in the 12 districts prepared an inter-sectoral costed communication plan for Ending Child Marriage (ECM) and Ending Violence Against Children (EVAC) for all the interventional districts of Jharkhand.

The prepared plan has received approval and consent from the district administration and all concerned departments in the districts. The plan is prepared for June 2023 to March 2024 period with the involvement of all departments, non-government organisations, and youth groups. The activities under the plan will be executed in the coming months.
